Answer: Finding your voice as a speaker entails (1) learning to be a competent speaker, (2) self-discovery, and (3) finding your place in society. By learning to be a competent speaker, we mean developing the technical skills associated to preparing and presenting effective speeches. Self-discovery refers to developing a sense of confidence and becoming more informed about the subjects and issues we care about. Finding your place in society refers to engaging your ideas and messages with those of others and discovering a sense of mutual interdependence that is at the heart of all meaningful communication.

Answer: While the transactional model of communication shows that it is a constant give and take among the components of the process, the dynamic model reveals that the process of public speaking can change and transform the lives of the people who participate in it. Two of the most popular theories associated with the dynamic model are the rhetorical situation, which argues that effective speeches tend to define a situation in the minds of listeners, and identification, which argues that effective speeches create a sense of shared purpose or community with listeners. For example, a speaker exhorting listeners to help a needy family would probably benefit from defining the family's situation for listeners and prescribing a vision of the audience coming together as a community to help them.

Answer: Underlying ethical speaking are three major considerations: respect for the integrity of ideas and information, a genuine concern for consequences, and the shared responsibilities of listeners. An ethical speaker addresses the integrity of ideas and information by speaking from responsible knowledge. This includes knowing the main points of a topic, understanding what experts say about it, noting differences of opinion, being aware of recent events concerning the topic, and realizing what is said might affect the lives of listeners. A speaker can demonstrate a genuine concern for consequences by understanding how words can influence others. With the increase in the variety of public communication channels, this concept becomes even more crucial. A high standard of honorable communication practices must be promoted that reflect open, tolerant, and respectful discussion of ideas. Finally, the shared responsibilities of listeners refers to the active role a listener should take in the communication process. When listeners hear a message they disagree with, it is up to the listeners to respond to the message in an ethical manner and present their opposing view.
